The League of Women Voters of the San Juans, a non-partisan, non-profit organization, is sponsoring this forum ahead of the primary election on August 5th. Community members who wish to ask questions of candidates but cannot attend in person may email their questions in advance of the forums to the League at pres.lwvsji@gmail.com.



In Friday Harbor on San Juan Island, **Mayor Ray Jackson** is <u>challenged for reelection</u> by **Pamela Hoke**, a fine artist and brand designer; **Evan Perrollaz**, owner of a coffee roasting company and deputy superintendent of the local hospital district; and **Emilio Santiago**, cultural resources program specialist at San Juan Island National Historical Park. Friday Harbor has a population of 2,747 and is the county seat, the only incorporated community in San Juan County and the economic center of San Juan Island.

An open, nonpartisan event to hear directly from those running to lead our community.

The Voter Forum is a moderated event during which candidates will present introductory statements and respond to your questions, within time limits. The League of Women Voters requires civil discourse in forums, and all questions to candidates must meet that requirement.

Around the League – State and National Issues Resist the Federal Threat to Medicaid

Healthcare affects democracy—and democracy depends on informed, active voters. The National Library of Medicine reports in "A Shared Destiny: Community Effects of Uninsurance" that, "For the communities in which uninsured individuals and families live, the lack or loss of health insurance coverage by some may undermine the shared economic and social foundations of the entire community." It goes on to say, "Declining economic stability and prosperity can foster a sense of social isolation and loss of confidence in public institutions and services." The current legislative proposals to severely reduce Medicaid funding are threats to our democracy.

The Senate has now passed H.R.1 of the 119th Congress, otherwise known as the "Big Beautiful Bill Act," and it included massive reductions to Medicaid.

With Medicaid being defunded at these levels by the House's version of H.R.1, the Washington State Health Care Authority reports that these reductions will have the effect of jeopardizing health care access for 1 out of every 5 Washingtonians. Ironically, the largest percentages of the population enrolled in Medicaid are in Republican Congressional Districts, 4 and 5. Rural hospitals have been cited as among the most affected health care services. They are already under-funded and rely on Medicaid funding for a significant portion of their patients and revenue.

The Right to Contraception and Why We Need to Protect It

The right to contraception is currently protected in the United States by a combination of federal court cases and state legislation. Tens of millions of women and other people of reproductive age rely on contraception to make decisions about their bodies and lives.

However, in recent years, government attacks

on reproductive freedom have made it clear how our fundamental rights can be eroded and taken away, making additional state and federal protections for contraception imperative.

- The League and partners filed legal briefs urging federal courts to invalidate an illegal executive order seeking to revoke birthright citizenship.
- The LWV strongly spoke out against SCOTUS using its shadow docket <u>to allow the Trump administration to deport migrants without due process</u>.
- A healthy US democracy requires ALL of its members to be able to live freely and access their fundamental rights. Ongoing attacks against the LGBTQIA+ community present a threat to democracy. The League publicly, and loudly, affirms that democracy depends on transgender rights.

Chapter Spot, the New LWV Payment System, Update

The League of Women Voters has switched to a new member portal, ChapterSpot, for all Leagues across the country. The new system was launched in February 2025. All members should have received an email to log in to the portal. If you haven't received an email, you can use this link to renew: https://portal.lwv.org/membership. You can pay online using a credit/debit card or by ACH (an electronic payment using the numbers on the bottom of a check). Once you have access to the portal, you will be able to update your own information, including contact information.

If you would like to make an additional contribution directly to LWV of the San Juans, as some members choose to do when they renew as Carrie Chapman Catt or Susan B. Anthony supporters, you need to separately submit dues and contributions. This can be done through the LWV Portal, which includes a separate donation button for local leagues, or by check to

LWVSJ. We encourage our members to send a check to LWVSJ as it ensures that your contribution goes to our local league. **PLEASE DO NOT ADD YOUR CONTRIBUTION TO YOUR DUES PAYMENT OR WE WILL RECEIVE ONLY 20% OF YOUR PAYMENT.** The State and National League will receive the remainder.
